The Orphan Train

From 1854-1929, over 200,000 orphaned children of immigrants to the US were put onto trains bound for the Midwest where they were taken in by families who wanted to adopt or who needed additional labor in their homes, businesses or farms. The novel tells the story of a friendship which develops between two women, 70 years apart, whose lives are very similar.

The Swans of 5th Avenue

Based on the true story of the social lives of Truman Capote, the author, and a group of wealthy women in New York City who lunched together, shared details of their lives, and vacationed to exotic places together. When Capote publishes a chapter from a forthcoming novel in *Esquire* magazine which is a thinly disguised account of their secret lives, all hell breaks loose, and Capote pays a heavy price.

An Invisible Thread

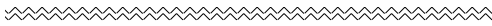
Laura Scroff & Alex Tresniowski

Fates and Furies

Lauren Groff joins the list of authors that make us wonder how sincere or honest a narrator truly can be (think *The Girl on the Train* or *Gone Girl*). In *Fates and Furies*, we meet Lotto and Mathilda—a couple in love, supporting each other through the trial and tribulations of married life envied by all who meet them. Lotto comes from a remarkably wealthy family and pines to be a successful actor but finds a niche in playwriting. Mathilda is the supportive wife although her quiet ways seem, well...too quiet. The book tells Lotto's story first (Fate) and then switches to Mathilda's story (Fury) in the second half. What quickly becomes apparent, especially as we read Mathilda's story, is how two people sharing the same life can see the world from two very different perspectives.

The Secret Chord

I have always been fascinated by the story of King David. In *The Secret Chord*, we meet King David well into his rule, and he's a bit grumpy about a recent war. Nathan, his prophet, is attempting to cheer him up and suggest they set out to record his remarkable life. David agrees and we are sent on journey back to the beginning of young David's life and his all too human rise to the throne encompassing power, greed, destruction, and fame. The novel excels at allowing a variety of characters who only appear briefly in the Old Testament to tell their full story and thus gives us a deeper understanding of King David's life.

The Underground Railroad

This remarkable novel follows the journey of Cora, a runaway slave seeking freedom through the underground railroad. Except in this novel, the Underground Railroad is a real construction burrowing below the South leading to freedom. Each time Cora leaves the railroad and ascends to the world above, she encounters forms of racism that are dehumanizing and shocking. She can never stay in one location long since she is being chased by Ridgeway, a slave catcher. This take on the American journey/odyssey and the struggle for survival in 1812 is stunning and unforgettable.
